<b>Objectives</b>	Acquiring knowledge and developing the ability to understand general principles and basic concepts and institutes of criminal law and criminal procedural law, as a legal framework for the application of forensic methods. In addition, the objective of the course is to acquire knowledge on the legal elements of certain criminal offense groups and individual criminal offenses, the role of material evidence and the importance of forensic methods in the evidentiary proceedings, as a key segment of the criminal procedure.		
<b>Outcome</b>	The ability to understand the basic institutes of criminal and criminal procedural law, certain criminal offenses, the evidentiary procedure, the significance and probative value of material evidence in criminal proceedings, the rights and duties of the expert, as well as the recognition of factual and legal conditions for the use of forensic methods in criminal proceedings.		
<b>Course syllabus</b>			
<b>Lectures</b>	Basic terms, nomenclature and legal terminology. Criminal act. Concept and elements of guilt. Guilt. System of criminal sanctions. Criminal offenses against life and body, against sexual freedom, against property, in connection with drug abuse, computer data security, against humanity and other goods protected by international law. Domestic violence. Terrorism. Criminal procedural law and forensic analysis and the forensics normative framework; the role of forensics in criminal proceedings. Organization of the judicial system of the Republic of Serbia. Proving in criminal proceedings (material evidence). Position of processors in the procedure of proving (court, prosecutor, defendant, defense attorney, witness, police, experts, expert). Proving action. Forensic methods in the function of proving in criminal proceedings. Position and role of experts in criminal proceedings. Evidence value of expertise in criminal proceedings.		
<b>Practice (exercises, OFT (other forms of teaching), study research work)</b>	Practical work will be realized through analysis of relevant cases from case law, study visits to state bodies (court, public prosecution, police) and solving practical tasks related to the application of substantive and procedural norms in forensic analysis.
